Abstract

The sociology of deviance has historically explored crime, sexual assertiveness and 'madness' as practices that deviate from a norm(al), and methods and institutions of control thereof. This dissertation focuses on the discourse surrounding mental illness, and how cinema reworks this, leading to a reinterpretation of conceptions of the self and the Other. Concentrating on the exploration of schizophrenia in two Indian films, Aparna Sen's 15 Park Avenue (2005) and Vijay Lalwani's Karthik Calling Karthik (2010), I consider how social situations and discursive regimes are portrayed. Currently, there exists hardly any research of this nature, and I hope that this dissertation will establish the need for it and prove to be a stepping stone for further such endeavours.
